Rare Disease Day Facts

 1 in 10 Americans are living with a rare disease/disorder and half are children

- Rare is one that affects fewer than 200,000 people
- Impacts more than 300 million people wordwide
- Over 7,000 identified rare diseases
- Awareness leads to...
 - increase of community support
 - increase of research and development
 - better diagnosis, treatment, and care
 - a crucial step before engagement
 - giving a voice to those who may not be able to advocate for themselves

Why I Raise Awareness: Meet Silas

- Born with Wiedemann-Steiner Syndrome (WSS)
 - affects about 1 in 25,000-40,000 people worldwide (exact estimate unknown)
 - most cases are spontaneous mutations, or 'de novo' (not inherited from parents)
 - symptoms can include developmental delays, neurodèvelopmental disorders; intellectual disability, communication disorders, ASD, ADHD, etc., neurological, muscular, & skeletal abnormalities, growth restriction, excessive hair growth, distinctive facial features, frequent infections, gastrointestinal & cardiac abnormalities, among various others.

Why the Zebra?

• The zebra is the official mascot of rare diseases. There is an old saying used in medical school, "When you hear hoofbeats, think of horses, not zebras." This encouraged medical students to consider common conditions rather than rare ones. But now we know that 1 in 10 people are actually a zebra, which is why the zebra's unique and distinctive stripes have become a symbol to represent the rare community.

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
